## SHORT-STORY CHECKLIST

As you edit your story (or someone else's), be sure to consider every one of the following questions.

## STORY STRUCTURE

Specifically consider each of the following, and check each off if you've achieved it.

- \_\_\_\_\_ Have you introduced the protagonist early?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Have you introduced the antagonist early?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Have you identified the protagonist's flaws and motivations?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Have you identified the antagonist's flaws and motivations?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Have you established the plot?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Did the protagonist participate in the resolution of the plot?
- \_\_\_\_\_ Has your protagonist undergone a fundamental change, either as a result of the resolution or that leads to the resolution?

## **STORY MECHANICS**

And as you read through the story, consider every one of these at all times.

- Does every scene advance the plot or develop the protagonist?
- Does every paragraph advance each scene?
- Does every sentence advance each paragraph?
- Does every word advance each sentence?
- Are you watching out for too many adverbs with dialogue tags? How about adverbs in other narrative?
- Are you overusing fancy dialogue tags?
- Are you overusing dialogue tags in general? Or are you underusing them?
- Are you keeping a consistent POV? (Remember, I don't publish second-person stories; you should write in the first person or third person.)
- Are you writing in the past tense? (Remember, I don't publish present-tense stories.)
- Are you keeping a consistent verb tense?
- Is your dialogue believable, or does it sound contrived? (Remember, reading it aloud is a great way to determine this, although you may wish to save reading aloud for outside class.)
- Does one sentence flow naturally to the next? (If not, do you need to combine sentences?)
- Does one paragraph flow naturally to the next?
